

The Transitional Care Clinic

While St. Vincent's celebrates its 100th year of service, we continue to look for new and innovative ways to improve our patients' lives. Recently, St. Vincent's noticed a troubling trend with a large population of our patients. Last year 10,540 patients who were admitted to our hospital did not have a designated Primary Care Physician (PCP) of their own, and of those patients:

- more than 16% had Medicaid
- more than 18% were uninsured
- combined, that's 34% who are living in poverty and struggling to pay for their own healthcare

Thus, St. Vincent's Transitional Care Clinic (TCC) was created to identify gaps in care and most importantly locate community resources for patients. Its purpose is to be a hand-off communication tool to get patients to existing resources like a Primary Care Physician (PCP) after they are discharged from the hospital. The Transitional Care Clinic (TCC) will help patients see a Primary Care Physician (PCP) within 90 days of discharge by addressing and removing barriers such as lack of insurance, financial constraints and transportation issues.

The Transitional Care Clinic (TCC) is a vital addition to our Health Ministry. Many outreach programs continue to be funded by gifts to St. Vincent's Foundation. We are blessed to have friends who allow us to extend our Mission in new ways.

Jacksonville is home to many people who are uninsured or underinsured. This population suffers from conditions like heart disease, diabetes, and countless chronic illnesses. Responding to the needs of our struggling neighbors, St. Vincent's held its first Medical Mission at Home on March 5, 2016. This day-long event in downtown Jacksonville focused on providing quality, compassionate healthcare to the homeless, uninsured, and indigent in our community—all for FREE.

Hundreds of volunteers, physicians, and nurses from St. Vincent's gathered at FSCJ's downtown campus to serve as healthcare providers, patient navigators, social services providers, and more to further St. Vincent's Mission of helping those who are struggling most in our community. Not only was basic healthcare provided, St. Vincent's also referred individuals to medical homes that will assist in providing a continuum of care for each person. St. Vincent's provided vision exams and eye glasses; hearing screenings and hearing aids; pastoral care from our hospital chaplains, and even foot washings as Jesus taught us in John 13:1-38.

Hundreds of people lined up to take advantage of this amazing day. As they were escorted by smiling volunteers through different triage centers, each one expressed gratitude of finally being able to receive the healthcare they so desperately needed. This program and its commitment to providing follow-up care changed the lives of many. Continuing this program is vital. The Medical Mission at Home will be held each year, and in 2017 it is set for April 29 at the Prime Osborn Convention Center.



A Letter from a Grateful Patient

For moms and dads of every generation, peace of mind after the birth of a child can be the greatest gift.

St. Vincent's HealthCare has been a vital part of the lives of countless people in our community. Our hospitals have served generations over the past 100 years.

St. Vincent's Southside is home to the **C. Herman and Mary Virginia Terry Women and Infants Pavilion**, which includes a unique, state-of-the-art Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU). This NICU is special because each infant has

a private room, which allows parents to stay with their babies in a comfortable setting. Research has shown the single-room model of infant care in the NICU decreases complications, improves weight gain and shortens the hospital stay for these tiny infants. St. Vincent's Southside was the first in the region to offer this safe environment of care.

We recently received a special letter to the donor who made this special place possible. We thought we would share it with you.

Dear Mrs. Mary Virginia Terry,

My name is Milena and I am a NICU patient at St. Vincent's Southside. Today I am three weeks old! I was born on May 13, 2016. When I was born at 29 weeks 5 days, I weighed only 2lbs 7 ounces, so they took me to be in the NICU. My mama had severe preeclampsia so I had to come out early, really early. My mama was very sick and couldn't see me for a few days.

I have received help with my breathing and other things. Now I am off the ventilator! It turns out St. Vincent's NICU is the best place to be if you are born early. The nurses told us about someone who donated a nice gift so me and my family could have the best care in town.

My mama and papa are blessed that I am here because of the amazing nurses and doctors who have done their best to help me out. I have my own room and special equipment and a big window. My mama can even sleep next to me! We are also enjoying hours of "kangaroo" sessions (skin to skin bonding time with my parents), which we wouldn't be able to do if we were not staying together during my stay.

We would like to say a big THANK YOU to you from the bottom of our hearts!! Only a few people can do what you have done for us, so THANK YOU!

My mama and papa decided for me to become a nurse so I can help people when I grow up. If only the world had more people like you, it would be a much better place!
